Islam Basics (Quran)

- Holy book of Islam
- (in addition to the Hadith or oral traditions of the prophet.)
- 114 chapters (Surat),
 6,000 verses (Ayat)





- Muslims believe written by Allah in Heaven (Perfect Arabic)
- Suras not chronological

Notes on Quran/Hadith

- Muslims may <u>not</u> be knowledgeable of contents
- Rely on Ulema (Sheikh, Imam, etc)
- Believe Quran is eternal, uncreated, uncorrupted, perfect Arabic, should not be translated
- "Hafez" One who commits entire Quran to memory



"JIHAD"

 Sometimes referred to as the 6th Pillar of Islam

 Greater Jihad: To realize Allah's will, lead a virtuous life, to fulfill the universal mission of Islam, and to spread the Islamic

Shari'ah – Islamic Law

- Arabic: "the way to water."
- Governs <u>all</u> aspects of life, from how to dress to inheritance.
- Viewed as the only embodiment of true justice.
- Huge variance in practice and interpretation in Muslim societies today.

Shari'ah

Apostasy:

- [a] "Then whosoever will, let him believe, and whosoever will, let him disbelieve" and "There is no compulsion in religion" on the one hand, and
- [b] the punishment of apostasy in Islam is death.
- Justification: belief and punishments are 2 separate issues.

Godfathers of Jihad

Sayed Qutb

Hanged for beliefs in 1966

Thus becoming martyr for caus

Hassan Al Banna Founder of Muslim Brotherhood Murdered in 1948 at age 43



Abdullah Azzam Killed in car bomb explosion in 1989







Sayyid Maududi
Most read Muslim in modern history.
Sentenced to death in 1953 in Pakistan
Sentence commuted.
He died in 1979 in Buffalo, NY

- 632-661 Reign of 4 Rightly Guided Prophets
- 8th /9th Cent's Major Sunni law schools founded

Shari'ah - Sunni

- Sources of authority:
 - 1. Qur'an
 - 2. Sunnah (Mohammad's living example of God's will, mostly written in books of Hadith.
 - Ijtihad (Reasoning and judgment to determine shari'ah, where Qur'an and Hadith are silent).
 - Ijma'ah (Consensus of Muslim scholars or of the entire Ummah)

- 610-622: Time period marked by resistance and persecution


- Abrogation: Later verses cancel out or 'update' earlier verses



Statistics

Islamic Terms

- <u>Dar al Harb v Dar al Islam</u>: Islamic fundamentalists see the world divided into these 2 spheres
- Dar al Harb (House of War): Should be the target of jihad; prevents a true Islamic state; Includes all infidel areas that must be conquered; Includes all areas (countries) not ruled by the Sharia.


- 60 % of the earth's oil reserves in or near Arabian Peninsula








Sects (Mathabs) of Sunni Islam

- <u>Hanbali</u>: Founder Imam Ahmad ibn Hanbal; Considered least tolerant school of thought regarding social and personal rules. Practiced in Saudi Arabia. 15% of Muslims.
- <u>Malaki</u>: Founder Malik ibn Anas; jurist from Medina/based on practices of the people of Medina; predominant in N. and W. Africa as well as Egypt; 2nd largest sect (25%)
- <u>Shafii</u>: Founder Muhammad al-Shafii; Considered most tolerant; Predominant in E. Africa, Indon, and SE Asia. Followed by 15% of Muslims.
- <u>Hanafi</u>: Founder Imam Abu Hanifa; major school of Iraqi Arabs; considered tolerant school and largest following; predominant in ME, India, Pak/Afgh. 45% of Muslims.



Islam 101


- No separation between church and state

Islam Basics (Hadith)

- · Other Islamic "Bible";
- Collection of early Muslim traditions which record the words and deeds of Muhammad
- Captured by wives, family, friends and Muslim leaders
- With Quran, establishes the basis for Islamic law





Islam Basics (Hadith)

- Not vague, tells reader exactly what to do, how to do it, and in what order
- What Mohammad said, did, and approved of



- · Shia have four collections
- Provides extensive information about Muhammad

Sunni v. Shia

- 85% Sunni; Identified with the importance of the Sunna (Hadith)
- Based on believed caliphate descendents of Mohammad

-<u>Sunni</u> - Abu Bakr, Umer, Uthman, Ali

-Shia - Ali ibn Abi Talib

 Shia believe only a descendent of Mohammed has the right to rule (Follow Ali: last Caliphate to be elected)



Sunni/Shia cont..

- Shia may pray only 3 times a day/include praise for Ali in prayers
- Believe in more of a "priesthood" (ie Ayatullah) regarding leadership



- Differ on leadership, doctrine, practice and scriptural issues
- · Shia dominated country: Iran

Sunni v. Shia

 Shia rely on <u>opinions of their</u> <u>Imams</u>, who are descendents of Mohammad



- Sunni rely more on the <u>traditions</u> (Hadith)
- Shia are further divided by the recognition of the Twelvers, Seveners (Ismailis).


Wahabi Sect


- Founder Muhammad ibn Abd al-Wahab (1703-1792)
- Called for strict adherence to Tawheed (Monotheism)
- Opposed to Shia and Sufi
- Considered by some to be Salafi
- Believe in literal sense of Qur'an and ljtihad (deduction apart from 4 schools)








- Quraysh tribe/Custodian of Kabba ("Cube")






 Held positions as religious, political and military leader of a community state. Wahabism (Arabic: Al-Wahhābīyya الوهابية) or Wahabism is a name sometimes applied to the conservative 18th century reformist call of Sunni Islam attributed to Muhammad ibn Abd-al-Wahhab, an Islamic scholar from what is today known as Saudi Arabia, who became known for advocating a return to the practices of the first three generations of Islamic history. Wahhabism formed the creed upon which the kingdom of Saudi Arabia was founded [1] and is the dominant form of Islam found in Saudi Arabia, and Qatar,[2] as well as some pockets of Somalia, Algeria and Mauritania. [citation needed] It is now often referred to as a "sect" [2] or "branch" [3] of Islam, though its supporters reject such a designation.





Language

- Arabic is the primary factor that determines membership in the national aggregate.
- It is the characteristic of the Arabic mind to be swayed more by words than ideas and more by ideas than facts.
- Spoken words to Arabs are as music.

Stylistic Elaborateness

- ex: colloquial Arabic for thank you:
 - Allāh yukaththin khayraka meaning: May allah increase your well-being.
 - Speedy recovery = ma alāk illā 'l 'afīye in sha allāh which means: May there be upon you nothing but health, if allah wills.

When two Americans meet:

- One may say, "Good morning." The other replies, "Good morning."
- This would offend an Arabian by such an ignorant reply.
 - The first Arabian would phrase his good morning wishes as follows:
 - "Nehārkum sa'īd" which means "May your day be prosperous. To which the other will reply, "Nehārkum sa'īd wemubārak. Meaning: "May your day be prosperous and blessed."


